We are very pleased to announce that RSLI will be offering a full-day intermediate/advanced workshop on Saturday, November 23rd, at St. Luke. Our faculty for the day will be our own Rachel Begley and Annette Bauer (recorder player, performer, educator). They will join forces to share their knowledge and keep us on our musical toes. Registration forms and more detailed information will be available closer to date, but put it in your calendars now. You won't want to miss this event. The new season is almost upon us, but first I want to take this opportunity to look back over the last few months, particularly to the wonderful RSLI Matinee back in June. We held our first in-person Matinee since 2019, and we had no fewer than ten performing individuals and groups! We also played a selection of half a dozen rounds, especially selected for the occasion, and, as usual, enjoyed delicious snacks and beverages. If you missed it, do try to join us next year, even if you aren't planning to perform!

Since then, members of the chapter have been out and about at summer workshops. RSLI had a particularly strong presence at the Amherst Early Music Festival, held this year at Union College in Schenectady, NY. Bravo to all EIGHT of you!

I myself was one of the faculty at the SFEMS Recorder Week, held in Berkeley, California, where I was joined by my illustrious colleagues Annette Bauer, Daphna Mor, Anne Timberlake, Greta Haug-Hryciw and Katherine Heater. In addition to performing in 2 faculty concerts, I also taught a very varied range of classes: On the Road with J.S.Bach, An American Odyssey, and Renaissance Consort Technique. Add to that leading the entire workshop on the first night as well giving a masterclass on Telemann and Mancini, it was a pretty full and rewarding week. It is certainly interesting going to workshops in other parts of the country, and it makes me appreciate how wonderful our chapter is, both musically and socially.



This summer I also wrote an article for the American Recorder magazine: "Recorders in Orchestras". It appears in the September 2024 edition, which was recently mailed to all ARS members. ## News from ARS

The Fall 2024 issue of *American Recorder* has arrived in your mail box - *if you're a member, of course*! It is, as usual, a trove of information from announcements and articles to reviews of music and books available. There is a huge, intriguing article by our Rachel Begley about the value and magic of recorders in orchestras. There is also an excellent continuation of an article by Lobke Sprenkeling on "Essential Tips for Recorder Consorts Ensemble Playing, Part Two". Part One appeared in the Summer 2024 issue of *American Recorder*. Knowing where the instrument you are playing fits in the overall sound of the ensemble, as well as tuning and ornamentation were all fascinating and informative. Tom Prescott had a lovely article recalling his years as a sought after (and beloved) recorder maker, and in the news department, Priscilla Herreid, the Artistic Director of Piffaro announced the appointment two new core members: Héloïse Degrugillier and Sian Ricketts. There are also reviews of music to play and books to buy, and a fun-looking new piece of sheet music, "Blue Toots". We should try it at RSLI! By the way, if you are not a member of ARS, now would be a perfect time to join! Go to american recorder.org



In revisiting past Newsletters, I found this treat in the January 2008 edition:

**Ginger Cookies** - from the kitchen of Margery Tippie

<u>Do not think you can wander off and do something else</u>

<u>while these are in the oven. You can't!</u>

- 1 cup chopped crystallized ginger
- 1 1/3 cups granulated sugar, plus additional for baking
- 4 cups all-purpose flour (measured by spooning flour into 1-cup measure and leveling off)
- 4 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 ½ teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon freshley grated nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 ½ sticks butter, at room temperature
- ½ cup molasses
- 2 large eggs
- 1. Combine chopped ginger and 2/3 cup of the sugar in food processor, process until ginger is finely ground. Set aside.
- 2. In medium bowl combine dry ingredients starting with the flour. Whisk well to mix. Set aside.
- 3. In large bowl, beat butter at medium speed until light;

add 2/3 cup sugar, beat until fluffy. Beat in molasses, then add eggs, one at a time beating well. Beat in ginger mixture. With mixer at lowest speed add flour 1 cup at a time, only until just combined after each addition.

- 4. Cover bowl & refrigerate at least 1 hour.
- 5. Preheat oven to  $350^{\circ}$  Set rack in middle of oven. Have ready 2 more ungreased sheets, preferably non-stick.
- 6. Place about 1/2 cup granulated sugar in shallow dish. Remove chilled dough from refrigerator and form into balls, measuring by tablespoonfuls. Roll dough balls in sugar to coat and place on <u>ungreased</u> baking sheets, spacing about 2 inches apart.
- 7. Bake cookies, one sheet at a time, 8-11 minutes, rotating sheet after about 5 minutes to ensure even baking. Do not overbake; cookies should be dry to touch and just firm on top, but still quite soft inside.
- 8. Remove with a metal spatula to wire racks to cool. Stored airtight, these will keep a long time; they may also be frozen.

(Makes about 3 dozen (I think; I never seem to remember to count them. - Margery)

## Dr. Wendy Powers

Conducting our September RSLI Meeting

Our Long Island neighbor Wendy Powers (Sag Harbor) has played and taught recorder in the NewYork area for many years. She is a historical musicologist specializing in music of the late 15th and early 16th centuries, particularly in Italy and France. She is currently an adjunct assistant professor at the Aaron Copland School of Music at Queens College, CUNY. She received her Ph.D. from Columbia University in 1994, submitting a dissertation on *The Music Manuscript Fondo Magliabechi XIX.178 of the Biblioteca Nazionale Centrale, Florence: A Study in the Changing Role of the Chanson in Late Fifteenth-Century Florence,* and is currently working on an edition of the complete works of the French composer Hesdin (d. 1538) for Broude Brothers.

Wendy is on the planning committee of the Amherst Early Music Festival, where she is a long-time staff and faculty member teaching recorder and early notation and has taught at early music workshops across the U. S. and at many ARS chapter meetings. She sat for twenty-eight years on the Board of Directors of the New York City series Music Before 1800 and is currently on the board of directors of the American Recorder Society. She has written about musical instruments for the Metropolitan Museum of Art Timeline of Art History (www.metmuseum.org). With Patricia Ann Neely, she co-directed Sag Harbor Early Music, a small spring concert series on Long Island.

#### **RSLI** Resolutions

This message comes from our past - it was in the January 2001 edition of the Newsletter.

Instructions for the new millennium adapted from the Dalai Lama:

- 1. Play no note before its time.
- 2. Follow the three Rs:
  Respect for key signatures
  Responsibility for accidentals
  Repeat as necessary:
- 4. Learn the rules of music theory, so you know how to break them properly.
- 5. When you realize you've made a mistake, console the player to your right.
- 6. Take into account that achieving great music on the recorder involves lots of explaining.
- 7. Open your arms to changes of tempo, but don't let go of your note values.
- 8. Remember that silence is often the loveliest music.
- 9. Share your knowledge of folding music stands. It's a way to achieve immortality.
- 10. Develop a love for music which exceeds your need to play soprano.
